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Announcements and Welcome

Welcome to this "Longest Night" service. "The name comes from the season - during this season in December, we experience the shortest day and the longest night of the year. But the name also applies to the feeling that a number of us have about this season. It is the "long dark night of the soul," "the winter of our discontent," in which memories of past experiences and the pain of present experiences can become overwhelming. For some, Christmas Day is the most difficult. For others, Christmas Eve, or New Year's Eve, or the beginning of another lonely New Year. In this service, we will have some singing appropriate to the season, recognizing that this season of joy can often be tinged with sorrow. We will invite you to meditate on the pain and anguish you may bring, and to offer your pain to the Christ child. We trust that you will find hope and comfort in knowing that you are not alone.

Silence for Meditation

Call to Worship

L: In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.

C: The Word became flesh and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth, and we have seen his glory.

L: In him was life, and that light was the light of all.

C: The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

Opening Prayer

God, we come to you on this Christmas season, with the pain growing inside us. As the nights have been growing longer, so has the darkness wrapped itself around our hearts.

In this season of our longest nights, we offer to you the pain in our hearts, the traumas that some of us cannot put into words.

God, we come to you as those who have been abused. We have been hurt, physically and emotionally. As children, as teenagers, as adults, we have had the trust we gave others violated. We have no confidence in ourselves; we cringe away from any threat. God, we are the outsiders. We are the ones who seem to stand on the edges of any group. We find ourselves always looking in

over someone else's shoulders, and when we try to move to the center, we feel as if we are getting elbowed out of the way.

God, we come to you as those who are grieving. A death or a loss has changed this day. Once it was a special day for us too. But someone has died. Someone has moved away. We have lost a job. We have lost a dream, a goal, a cause. We find ourselves adrift, alone, lost in a terrifying new world. This season reminds us of all that used to be, and cannot be any more.

God, we come to you as those who are struggling. From this temporary period of peace, we will go back to situations where we are wrestling with personal, relationship, or financial challenges. Help us to carry the peace of the Christ child with us. Strengthen us and give us the resources we need to face those challenges.

God, we come to you as those who are sick. We struggle with health issues and long-term illnesses in ourselves, our friends, and our families. Grant us healing. Renew us in hope, as we look forward to your New Day, the Day of Resurrection, in which crying and sorrow and pain will be no more. Strengthen us in this hope now, as we walk as yet by faith.

The memories of what was, the fears of what may be, stifle us. All around us we hear the sounds of celebration, the jingle of cash registers, the rustle of wrapping paper. But some of us have nothing we can give, and some of us have no one to give anything to. This is our longest night, Lord. Please be near us tonight. We ask it in Jesus' name. Amen.

The Great "O Antiphon" Readings and Responses

O Wisdom

Reading: Isaiah 65:17-25

Response: O Wisdom, proceeding from the mouth of the Most High, pervading and permeating all creation, mighty ordering all things: Come and teach us the way of prudence.

Antiphon (Sung)

O come, **O Wisdom** from on high, embracing all things far and nigh: in strength and beauty come and stay; teach us your will and guide our way. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to you, O Israel!

O Adonai

Reading: Isaiah 35:1-10

Response: O Adonai and ruler of the house of Israel, Who appeared to Moses in the burning bush and gave him the Law on Sinai: Come with an outstretched arm and redeem us.

Antiphon (Sung)

O, come, o, come, our **Lord of Might**, Who to your tribes on Sinai's height In ancient times gave holy law, In cloud and majesty and awe. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel Shall come to vou, O Israel!

O Branch of Jesse

Reading: Isaiah 11:1-9

Response: O Branch, of Jesse, who stands for an ensign before the people, Before whom kings are mute and to whom the nations will do homage: Come quickly to deliver us.

Antiphon (Sung)

O, come **O Branch of Jesse** free, Your own from Satan's tyranny From depths of hell you people save and give them vict'ry o'er the grave. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel Shall come to you, O Israel!

Okey of David

Reading: Isaiah 40:1-11, 28-31

Response: O Key of David and scepter of the house of Israel, You open and no one can close, You close and no one can open: Come and rescue the prisoners who are in darkness and in the shadow of death.

Antiphon (Sung)

O, come, O Key of David, come, And open wide our heav'nly home; Make safe the way that leads on high, And close the path to misery. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel Shall come to you, O Israel!

O Dayspring

Reading: Isaiah 9:1-7

Response: O Dayspring, splendor of light everlasting, light which no darkness can overcome: Come and enlighten and encourage those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death.

Antiphon (Sung)

O, come, **O Dayspring** come and cheer, O Sun of justice, now draw near Disperse the gloomy clouds of night, And death's dark shadows put to flight. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel Shall come to you, O Israel!

O King of Nations

Reading: Isaiah 55:1-5, 10-13

Response: O King of the nations, the ruler they long for, the cornerstone uniting all people: Come and save us all, whom You formed out of clay.

Antiphon (Sung)

O, come, O King of Nations, come, O Cornerstone that binds in one: Refresh the hearts that long for you; restore the broken, make us new. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to you, O Israel!

O Emmanuel

Reading: Isaiah 7:10-14

Response: O Emmanuel, our king and our Lord, The anointed for the nations and their Savior: Come and save us, O Lord our God.

Antiphon (Sung)

O, come, O, come, **Emmanuel,** and ransom captive Israel, That mourns in lonely exile here until the Son of God appear. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel Shall come to you, O Israel!

Laying on of Hands and Prayer Hymn WOV #738 "Healer of Our Every Ill"

People come up for the laying on of hands. They tell the intercessor any specific needs they may have. The intercessor then places a hand on the person's shoulder or head and says, "I lay my hands upon you in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, beseeching him to uphold you and fill you with grace, that you may know the healing power of his love. Amen." After receiving the Laying on of Hands, people may light candles and place them in the candle box as a sign of God's continued presence in our lives, especially in our times of need.



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
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
